# Preface

This is the fourth edition of CSA C22.2 No. 158, *Terminal blocks*, one of a series of Standards issued by the Canadian Standards Association under Part II of the *Canadian Electrical Code*. It supersedes the previous editions published in 2010, 1987, and 1984.

This edition incorporates the following changes from the previous edition:

- a) alternative marking requirements;
- b) new requirements for spacings for LED lighting equipment;
- c) an updated corrosion cracking test;
- d) introduction of alternative marking methods; and
- e) updated marking requirements.

For general information on the Standards of the *Canadian Electrical Code, Part II*, see the preface of CSA C22.2 No. 0, *General Requirements — Canadian Electrical Code, Part II*.

This Standard is considered suitable for use for conformity assessment within the stated scope of the Standard.

This Standard was prepared by the Subcommittee on Terminal Assemblies, under the jurisdiction of the Technical Committee on Industrial Products and the Strategic Steering Committee on Requirements for Electrical Safety, and has been formally approved by the Technical Committee.

This Standard has been developed in compliance with Standards Council of Canada requirements for National Standards of Canada. It has been published as a National Standard of Canada by CSA Group.

**Interpretations:** The Strategic Steering Committee on Requirements for Electrical Safety has provided the following direction for the interpretation of standards under its jurisdiction: “The literal text shall be used in judging compliance of products with the safety requirements of this Standard. When the literal text cannot be applied to the product, such as for new materials or construction, and when a relevant committee interpretation has not already been published, CSA’s procedures for interpretation shall be followed to determine the intended safety principle.”

**Notes:**

- 1) *Use of the singular does not exclude the plural (and vice versa) when the sense allows.*
- 2) *Although the intended primary application of this Standard is stated in its Scope, it is important to note that it remains the responsibility of the users of the Standard to judge its suitability for their particular purpose.*
- 3) *This Standard was developed by consensus, which is defined by CSA Policy governing standardization — Code of good practice for standardization as “substantial agreement. Consensus implies much more than a simple majority, but not necessarily unanimity”. It is consistent with this definition that a member may be included in the Technical Committee list and yet not be in full agreement with all clauses of this Standard.*
